



Chicago STOP Smoking Research Project

Dr. Andrea King at The University of Chicago is conducting the Chicago STOP Smoking Research Project, which is funded by the NIH. The study tests the effects of a drug called naltrexone in combination with nicotine patch and 6 one-on-one behavioral counseling sessions. Naltrexone is FDA-approved for other addictions such as alcohol and opiate dependence. For 3 ½ months, half of the participants will receive naltrexone while the other half will receive an identical placebo. Participants attend 10 visits at either our location at The University of Chicago in Hyde Park (5 miles south of the Loop) or at the American Lung Association in West Loop. Financial compensations for completing study measures and travel reimbursements are included. C-STOP will be enrolling 300 participants between June 2006 and August 2008.
